Annual Special Meeting for Members: featuring *Home Fronts of Iowa - 1940-45*

You are invited to attend the Society's Annual Meeting of the membership on **Sat. March 5, 10am**, at the Ames Public Library's Farwell T. Brown Auditorium, 515 Douglas Avenue in Ames.



Following a short business meeting, Lisa Ossian, associate professor of history, Des Moines Area Community College, Ankeny will present her program, **The Home Fronts of Iowa, 1940-45.**

During World War II, the home front contributions of Iowans and Americans divided into four historical fronts:

- the farm front,
- the production front,
- the community front,
- and the kitchen front.

Food for Freedom directed American farmers in the all-out production needed for the war effort and relief for our Allies. Iowa farmers lead the nation in crop and livestock production.

Iowa's small businesses and industries added to the "Arsenal of Democracy" by filling many military sub-contract orders. The two newly constructed ordnance plants in Burlington and Ankeny produced thousands of bombs and millions of machine gun bullets. Iowa's small towns and cities matched and exceeded records in the eight War Bond Drives as well as the numerous scrap drives for iron, paper, rubber and tin. Iowa's women met the rationing and production requirements demanded from the federal government in all home kitchens.

Lisa Ossian earned her Master's degree in women's studies at Eastern Michigan University and her doctorate at Iowa State University in agricultural history and rural studies. In addition to research on Iowa during the early Depression era and WWII home front years, she also did a national survey of children's experiences during WWII. She has written a book, *The Home Fronts of Iowa, 1939-1945* that will be available at the program. Refreshments will be served.

Two Ames entities were involved in war production. The coveted Army-Navy "E" award was presented on March 29, 1944 to the Collegiate Manufacturing Co., Ames, for their "high achievement" in the production of raincoats for the armed forces. A second "E Flag" was presented to Iowa State for participation in uranium research for the Manhattan Project.



The Story and History of Daley Park in west Ames

In the early 1990's, Ames was growing rapidly on the west side and in 1994, it was determined that a park should be planned to serve residents in that area. Three fortuitous events made this park possible.

Hunziker & Furman Corporation committed to selling the City six acres of land at half of the appraised value and in addition, donated another four acres for the proposed park. Then, the City was awarded a \$150,000 State of Iowa REAP* Grant to purchase the land and begin development of a park.

The third event was that Helen Rae Daley Smith, then living in Arizona, donated \$100,000 for the park, with the understanding that the park would be named for her parents Raymond and Gertrude Daley and her brothers Merle, Max and Bob, all deceased.

Raymond built homes and he and Gertrude lived their whole lives in Ames. Merle, Max and Bob also lived in Ames for most of their lives. Helen also donated \$5,000 to the City, stipulating that the interest be used to maintain and repair the Park's recreational structures.

About Helen Rae Daley Smith



Helen was born September 27, 1922 in Ames to Ray and Gertrude Daley and grew up at 925 Clark Avenue.

She was married for over 40 years to Clyde B. Smith.

Clyde was born in Southern Iowa and worked in the coal mines until 1936, when at age 16 he hitchhiked to Ames and got a job with grocery pioneer, Keith Rushing. Ames residents may remember Rushing's stores, first on Main Street and later north of Lincoln Way and east of Kellogg Avenue.

After World War II service, Clyde and Helen returned to Ames to start grocery stores in Roland (below), Marshalltown (below, "Smitty's") and Cedar Rapids.



Fifty years ago the couple moved to Arizona and started a multi-million dollar grocery chain called Smitty's Big Town, a retailing concept that was later copied by Sam Walton, founder of Wal-Mart Inc., among others. Smitty's catered to families and supported hundreds of local charities in the towns where stores were located. This past November, Clyde Smith, now 91, was in Marshalltown to sign his biography, *Pioneering the Superstore: A Retail Revolution*. **

Helen was an active participant in Smitty's Big Town Stores, assisting and advising in many decisions and acting as hostess for the many events they sponsored, including golf tournaments at their estate. She became known as a philanthropist, benefactress and independent investor who touched many people with her generosity in Iowa, Arizona and Pennsylvania. Her granddaughter remembers visiting Story City when Helen's mother, Gertrude, was a resident of Bethany Manor, another recipient of Helen's many gifts.

Helen had an adventurous side and after retiring in 1981, was the first woman to become a NASCAR team owner and set a precedent as the first woman allowed in pit row. She traveled throughout the country pulling her cars, stopping once in Ames for family to view them.

Helen and Clyde had three daughters: Sandy Sojka and husband, Gary of Middleburg, PA; Linda Barkdoll and husband, Phillip of Phoenix, AZ and Vinton, IA; and Karen Gish and husband, Dale of Dolores, CO. She built a mansion for herself in Vinton, Iowa next to the Barkdolls. Sadly, Karen and Dale Gish were killed in Colorado when their motorcycle was struck by an out-of-control van.

Helen and Clyde divorced in 1980 and he moved to Texas. Helen later married but parted from a retired military officer, Earl Morgan.

About Daley Park & Greenbelt

Daley Park & Greenbelt was dedicated September 7, 1996. Helen cut the ribbon with then-Mayor Larry Curtis. Among the many attending were City Council members Ted Tedesco and Herman Quirnbach, City Manager Steve Schainker and County Supervisor Fred Mathison.

Neighbors of the existing College Creek subdivision were actively involved in the process of developing the



park, especially in the selection of play equipment. Three Eagle Scout projects were also incorporated into the park design – a wetlands planting area adjacent to College Creek, construction of a picnic table and mini-shelter and grill and bench installation.

The Park is in the Bentwood subdivision just south of Lincoln Way on the western edge of Ames at 340 Wilder Blvd. It is 10 acres and features lighting throughout, a walking trail, large shelter house accommodating 100 persons, grills, playground equipment, pedestrian bridge and a wetland prairie area. The entire

park is handicapped accessible with water, sewer and electrical service.

A newspaper article read: "Roller bladers, joggers and bikers have yet another park in Ames to exercise in and enjoy the beauty of nature."



Daryle and Joyce Vegge have lived in the area since 1978. When they moved there, they were told their children would be bussed to school and that a park was in the plan - that they assumed would be in the near future. To quote Joyce, "It was not built soon enough for our children to enjoy, but we are grateful for the opportunities to take our granddaughters there when they visit. The Park is very well used."

The donation for the park was not Helen's first gift to the City of Ames. In 1992 Helen donated \$6,000 to buy art for the Ames City Hall and in 1993 she gave another \$5,000 to the City's Public Art Commission to purchase art for the City Hall with the stipulation that all the artists be Ames High School graduates. The artworks were also in memory of her parents and brothers.

In 1993 Helen was named Ames High School's Favorite Alum. On that occasion, her daughter Linda spoke for her, saying "Helen's belief that she has truly been blessed has been one reason she has been so successful in her life. She has always remembered her roots in Ames and also realized what an impact growing up in such a fine community had in her life. She would urge all of you to make some contribution to society, your community -- not only momentarily but also in sharing the many God given talents bestowed on us. Each individual can and does make a difference."

Helen died unexpectedly on Thursday, March 9, 2006 while writing letters at her desk in her home in Biltmore Estates, Phoenix. Memorial services were held in Scottsdale, AZ and Adams Funeral Home in Ames. She is buried in the Ames Municipal Cemetery.

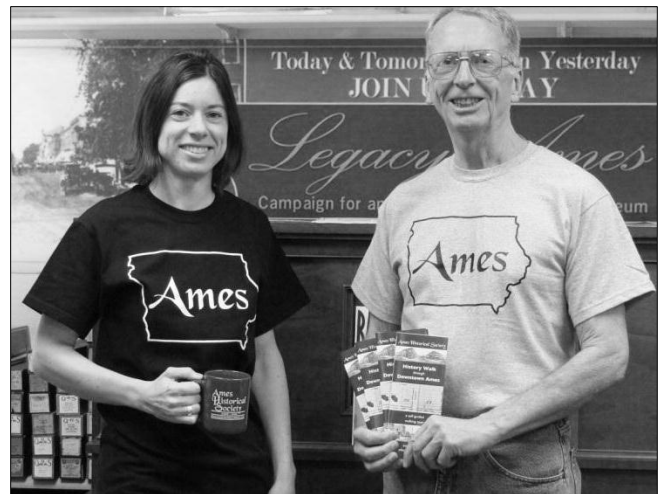
The McFarland Clinic Story: Making Medical History for 65 Years

President's Column

From Peggy Baer, Ames Historical Society President

I've been honored to be your President for the last year. The work accomplished by the other board members, the staff and the volunteers is truly amazing! Many people spend thousands of hours each year to accomplish the goals of the Society.

This organization has grown over the last ten years, and the table below summarizes this growth. As with any growing organization, we are not without our growing pains!



- **Balancing service delivery with financial responsibility:** We are the caretakers of Ames history and provide access to that history. Our staff does a fantastic job of serving our members and visitors but the service requests, presentations and questions outnumber the staff hours and the gulf is growing.

We are now owners of the building at 416 Douglas, and have four part-time paid staff. It is the Board's responsibility to ensure that office space is fully rented, utilities and building expenses are paid and that sufficient operating funds exist to pay the staff. Our highest priority is increasing operating dollars to meet these needs.

We have spirited discussions about instituting or raising fees and whether that could erode the "good-will" that you have for us. We will continue to work to maintain a proper balance between being a service organization and a business.

- **Storage Space:** The Society has a number of storage spots around town to house our growing collection of artifacts and archives. We rent space at 108 Fifth Street and the back of the Pantorium, and have a number of "free" spaces such as one at US Bank. We have been looking for over a year for a place to consolidate storage. Our goal is to have 2000-3000 square feet of space, in or near downtown, with higher ceilings, easy 24/7 access, and dry with conditioned air. We will continue to look at available space that is affordable.
- **Exhibition Space:** Those of you who have been at headquarters know that space for displays is extremely limited. Our goal is to move into the remainder of the first floor at 416 Douglas as soon as we can afford to give up the attractive rent we receive from the tenant. In the meantime, we have arranged for the use of the three gallery spaces at the Octagon for a show in the summer of 2012, celebrating Union Pacific's 150th Anniversary. Union Pacific owns the rail line through Ames, but until 1995 the railroad was the Chicago & North Western. We will be seeking a group interested in working on the show - please let me know if you would like to join us on this project.
